Scrapbooking

Presidents,

If your club does not have a scrapbook yet, this may be the year to have one created by one of your artistic members or their spouses. The Scrap Book is a living history of your tour as President and the club. Please consider doing one this year. Below is a copy of the rules for Scrap booking. I hope to see many Entries at the Spring Conference.

CLUB SCRAPBOOK AWARD RULES

The Lions, Lioness and Leo Club scrapbooks entered in this Contest are the winners, or in the case where the winner is unable to compete, the runner-up of the respective contests held at the District level. **THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR MUST SEND THE NAMES OF THE WINNERS AND RUNNERS-UP TO THE MD19 CONTESTS AND AWARDS CHAIRPERSON AND THE MULTIPLE DISTRICT 19 OFFICE BY APRIL 30.**

This is to be a scrapbook of the **CURRENT YEAR'S ACTIVITIES**, not a club history book. Previous year's material can be added to a Club History Book, but SHALL NOT be submitted with the current year's Scrapbook for the contest.

1. JUDGING WILL BE BASED ON:

- a. 5 points for each of the following; (Max. 20 possible points)
Entries must be clearly identified on cover with:
 - The Club's name;
 - The District and Zone of the Club;
 - The fiscal year the Scrapbook was completed and

- The name of the Lion/Lioness/Leo who compiled the scrapbook ON THE INSIDE OF THE FRONT COVER.

The first activity depicted in the scrapbook must be the Installation of Incoming Officers. A title page, index or introductory page may precede the pictures of the first activity. Following the index page will be the summary index pages for Service Activities, Social Activities and newspaper / magazine / TV and radio coverage listing each activity and/or print item and media coverage along with page number. The scrapbook will be presented in the 3 divisions listed below in c, d, and e.

Points will also be awarded as follows: **135 Maximum points**

- b. 15 maximum points Appearance
- c. 40 maximum points for Service Activities
- d. 20 maximum points Social Activities
- e. 40 maximum points Club PR (See Rule 2a)
- f. 20 maximum points on Cover Requirements (See 1a)

2. SCRAPBOOK'S CONTENTS:

- a. A Title page summarizing newspaper / magazine printed stories and / TV and radio coverage will be provided following the index page. A maximum of 10 points each

can be awarded for newspaper and magazine print material supported by clippings and TV and radio coverage logged through a media log. **Maximum of 40 points possible.**

- b. Any and all photographs and memorabilia of service activities, social activities, thank-you letters to speakers and city officials, programs, brochures, etc. Examples of various types of Lions Days and activities and any other information pertinent to one's Lions Club year.

3. TURNING IN AND PICKING UP OF

4. ENTRIES:

- a. Entries must be delivered to the MD19 Office on or before the MD19 District Governor Elect School in May in order for them to be judged prior to the MD19 Annual Convention. The scrapbooks will be taken to the Annual Convention by the MD19 Contests and Awards Committee.
- b. Delegates must arrange to pick up the scrapbooks at the Annual Convention.
- c. The Multiple District Office will NOT be responsible for entries not claimed by the final session of the Convention.

THREE COMPETENT JUDGES ARE TO BE APPOINTED BY THE CONTESTS AND AWARDS COMMITTEE. At the time of judging, a check-list based on the requirements listed in the Contests and Awards Book will be provided each judge for each entry. A sheet will be left in each Club Scrapbook with a compilation of the judges' scores for the club's information.
